In 1957, the Home was relocated to new building on three acres overlooking Jamaica Pond and named changed to Rogerson House in tribute to Charles E. Rogerson, the organization's eighth president.



In 1860, the organization was founded in Boston's South End as the Home for Aged Men.



In 1887, the philanthropist Edward D. Rice bequeathed his mansion to the Home for Aged Couples. There were 50 rooms and the residence was known for being the only place where couples could live together.

Today, the Rogerson serves more than 1,500 Greater Boston families through 26 facilities and programs. These services include housing, adult day health programs, fitness training and memory loss care and treatment. Visit Rogerson.org for more information.
