

Rogerson Communities Opens 2 New Properties

The Honorable Mayor Martin J. Walsh joined Jamie Seagle, President of Rogerson Communities, on Thursday, May 28 at the Cooper House ribbon cutting in Roxbury. The opening of Cooper House brought 37 new units of affordable elder housing to market. It completed the renovation and renewal of what was a blighted three-acre parcel into an attractive block of housing that now includes four buildings with a total of 161 low-income housing units.

Cooper House is one of three original structures located on the historic site of the Home for Aged Couples overlooking Franklin Park in Egleston Square. The three antique buildings sat in total disrepair when Rogerson Communities took on a redevelopment plan in 1999. A fourth building, Spencer House, is new construction developed by Rogerson Communities. Spencer House opened in 2007 with 46 units of affordable housing and a state-of-the-art Adult Day Health Center.

As part of a new community partnership, Rogerson Communities purchased art for Cooper House's public spaces from

local artists through Discover Roxbury, an artist-run, community-based organization that leverages the neighborhood's artistic, cultural, and historic assets to promote civic engagement and economic development in Roxbury.

On October 5, 2015, Rogerson Communities was pleased to host the ribbon-cutting ceremony announcing the opening of Hong Lok House on Boston's Essex Street. The much anticipated completion of Hong Lok brings a total of 74 new units of low-income housing for elders to this neighborhood, replacing the 28-unit elder housing facility originally developed in 1978.

The new Hong Lok House will be the center of activity for Chinatown seniors and will promote a sense of stability, caring and community. Most important, all units will

remain affordable in perpetuity. The October 5 ribbon-cutting was the culmination of a nine year struggle to redevelop a vital center for Chinatown's seniors. Rogerson Communities undertook the complicated task of fundraising and securing financing as well as managing design and construction of the new eight-story Hong Lok House. Rogerson's expertise included gathering government funding sources, and spearheading private fundraising in order to move the project forward.

"It was a privilege to have worked with Rogerson Communities to bring this project to fruition. The end product is something the entire community can be proud of and I am pleased to be welcoming each tenant into their new home," stated Ruth Moy, Executive Director of the Greater Boston Chinese Golden Age Center. ■
